A Message from the President



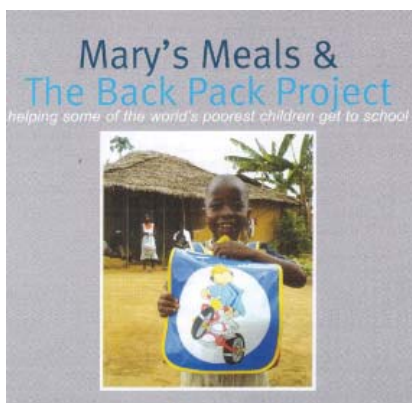

Mary's Meals



A PROJECT supported by SI Manchester is Mary's Meals For further details please contact members of SI Manchester.

This is a simple way of helping children from poor families in countries like Malawi and Liberia to get to school. Very often these families cannot afford to buy basic things like pencils

and copy books, or even suitable clothes for their children to wear to school so their children miss out on school and an education. This is a tragic situation because studies show that an education is the best way a chronically poor child can escape from poverty in later life.

The Back Pack Project helps solve this problem by providing poor children with the things they need in order to attend school. This can be achieved by people in the UK filling up an old school bag/back pack with some everyday school things. These bags will then be distributed to children who really need them.

The organisation has been working with poor communities around the world since 1992. Much of this work is about helping children gain an education through the Mary's Meals school-feeding campaign. The Back Pack Project is proving to be another effective way of helping children get to school.

104,500 backpacks have already been delivered to children in Malawi, Uganda and Liberia. The boy in the picture is from Liberia. Years of war meant many people missed out on school. Now there is a peace and families are desperate for their children to gain an education. Few can afford even basic school materials. The Back Pack Project offers a simple, practical way of helping them.

Second hand items are good! They do not need to be specially bought. As long as things are in good condition, that is fine.

Members of SI St Helens held a "Spectacular" Collection of unwanted reading glasses and prescription sunglasses. Special thanks must go to Doreen Williams, a new member of the club, who offered coverage by way of an appeal through the local newspaper the *St Helens Star*.

Many many people took the spectacles into the *Star* Offices and over 600 pairs were collected which will be sent to "Sightsavers - Vision Aid" who use specialist people who restore them and redirect them to third World Countries enabling the Specs to be recycled and used effectively by people with seeing difficulties.

Pictured along President Alison Tickle, is Julie Lavin a *Star* employee, Doreen Williams and some of the 600 pairs of specs handed over to Paul Parkinson a member from Ashton Rotary club.

Ashton in Makerfield with Haydock Rotary have been collecting spectacles for 5 years and have sent approx 15000 pairs away. They have made this into an ongoing project. A box will continue to be available at the *Star* office.



ASHTON-UNDER-LYNE

In September 2007, an article was printed in the South Lancashire Leader, which told of an initiative to provide 3,500 items of underwear for the children of FOMO (Friends of Mulanje Orphans).

The project was the brainchild of members from SI Ashton-under-Lyne and the mammoth project which exceeded all expectations was helped by other clubs in the region, along with donations received from individuals and businesses who read about the project in the local newspapers.



Fomo are now helping well over 5,000 children in 13 centres in Mulanje, Malawi and this little boy is based at Nansomba Centre Mulanje in Malawi. The underwear from SI has been distributed across the other 12 centres and from reports that have reached the club from the Woodworths, the children are highly delighted.

WILMSLOW

Wilmslow and District celebrated their 40th Anniversary Charter Dinner, on 14th November 2008, where a commemorative cake was cut by Founder Member Mrs Margaret Charnley along with President Wendy.

An article "Four Decades of Dedication", outlining the work of Wilmslow Soroptimists, followed in the local press on 4th December.
